PROJECT MEETINGS AT THE FAIRGROUNDS

This must be done <u>at least two weeks prior</u> to the meeting. Do not contact the fair directly. After the dates are cleared with the fairgrounds, the 4-H staff will get back to you to let you know if the dates you requested will be okay. The County Director must approve all facility use agreements for insurance to be in effect.



FAIR REQUIREMENTS & EXHIBITOR GUIDEBOOK

2017 FAIR REQUIREMENTS

Primary Fair Participation Requirements

In order to be eligible to exhibit at the Fair, members must complete the following:

- Attend 70% of Club meetings prior to the Fair.
- Maximum of two (2) meetings may be made up with a Key Leader approval prior to Fair entry forms deadline (See Make Up Policy).
- Participate in a Countywide 4-H event.
- Attend a minimum of six hours of instruction in project area.
- Be enrolled in 4-H by the second Monday in October.

Anything But Animals / Still Exhibits / Fair Participation Requirements

In order to be eligible to exhibit Anything But Animals / Still Exhibits projects at the fair, members must complete the following:

- Attend 70% of Club meetings prior to the Fair entry deadline.
- Maximum of two (2) meetings may be made up with a Key Leader approval prior to fair entry forms deadline (See Make Up Policy).
- Participate in a countywide 4-H event in project area.
- Give presentation at the County level or judge or be a Room Coordinator at County/Sectional Presentation Day (to qualify to judge or be a Room Coordinator: must be 13 years or older as of December 31st of the program year and have given one gold presentation in the past).
- All Star/B.L.A.S.T. must give a presentation at a Countywide event.
- Attend a minimum of six hours of instruction in project area.
- Be enrolled in 4-H by the second Monday in October.

Livestock Fair Participation Requirements

In order to be eligible to exhibit an animal at the Fair, including Replacement Heifers, members must complete the following:

- Attend 70% of Club meetings prior to the Fair entry deadline.
- Maximum of two (2) meetings may be made up with a Key Leader approval prior to Fair entry forms deadline (See Make Up Policy).
- Participate in a Countywide Field Day and give reasons.
- Attend Animal Ethics Training every year.
- Give presentation at the County level or judge or be a room coordinator at County/Sectional Presentation Day (to qualify to judge or be a Room Coordinator: must be 13 years or older as of December 31st of the program year and have given one gold presentation in the past).
- All Star/B.L.A.S.T. must give a presentation at a Countywide event.
- Attend a minimum of six hours of instruction in project area.
- Be enrolled in 4-H by the second Monday in October.
- May only sell one (1) market animal (Dairy and Beef Replacement Heifers are not considered market, but are breeding or commercial).
- Turn in completed record book (see Completion of Year Requirements) by June 30th of current year to be eligible to sell at the following year's Fair.
- On the 4th year of selling the same species, indicate second animal you raised within a 4-H project or list another 4-H project you have met the minimum requirements, and get that project leader to sign your Livestock Fair Participation Report.







2016-2017 GLENN COUNTY 4-H RECORD BOOK Personal Development Report (PDR) TIP SHEFT

This guidance document is to help identify the appropriate categories for your Glenn County 4-H activities. You may have additional activities that are not listed here. Please remember that the current 2016-2017 California 4-H Record Book Manual and Adult Partner's Guide is the official guidance document <u>http://4h.ucanr.edu/files/218972.pdf</u>.

Record Books – Make sure to update and correct all notes and suggestions from your Key Leader and County Record Book Judging from your previous year. If a member forgets to list an entry in one year and wants to list it in the next year's book, they can. List it the same way and make a note that this was done in XX year.

WHAT GOES WHERE? Where do I place everything I have accomplished this year in my Personal Development Report?

Here is a helpful tool for recording 4-H events and activities, but first, make sure to read these important guidelines:

- Record participation and activities both inside and outside of 4-H for the current program year.
- When you attend a 4-H event, record it as a 4-H event attended.
- If you did something at that event that meets the requirements in another area(s), you can record that as well, BUT that activity can only be counted in one category it's your choice. The statement explaining "double dipping" or "double counting" has changed to a positive statement, instead of a "Don't" statement. There are cases when a member may get to count an activity AND an event from the same event.
- Some events and activities may be applicable for multiple categories. Record activities in the most appropriate or needed category for Star Ranks. Check out the requirements in the star ranking system at the beginning of the year to see where you need to focus.
- If you participate at an event activity in multiple roles, be sure to clearly differentiate the roles to ensure that the judge understands your specific contributions. We don't want the person that scores your book to think you accidentally double counted one activity.
- You may record up to two significant activities outside of 4-H in categories 2, 4, 5, 6 and 7.

The following outline matches the Personal Development Report. If you attended an event or accomplished something listed in a category, make sure you put it in that same numbered section on your PDR form for appropriate credit.

#1. Projects Completed

Record the projects you have completed. Complete a minimum of six hours of project instruction or more as required by the project leader. During the current year, 80% average attendance across all projects is required to receive an achievement rank.

#2. 4-H Project Skill Activities

Record events or activities that demonstrate your knowledge to an audience or judge. Activities may be recorded even if you are not enrolled in the corresponding project – as long as the skills are related to a 4-H project. This includes exhibits non-judged and judged, showmanship, knowledge contests and judging contests.

* You may not participate as a 4-H member in jackpot or prospector shows as these shows do not comply with 4-H Policy. Participation in these shows should <u>NOT</u> be recorded as a 4-H experience or as an "Outside 4-H" experience. Events that do not comply with 4-H Policy may not be recorded in the Record Book at all.

- Champion Drive

Project Skill Activities Outside of 4-H: Record participation at shows, competitions and contest that relate to a 4-H project skill but are NOT strictly 4-H events or do not have 4-H classes. <u>Examples:</u> Pacific Poultry Breeders Association Show, ARBA National Convention, AKC Dog Shows, and a Quilting Conference.

#3. Events Attended (must actively participate)

Record 4-H events that you attend during the year. Count any 4-H event that you attend outside of regular club and project meetings. Multiple day events, such as County Fair and Conferences count as one event. You may receive credit for attending the event as well as completing an activity that fits in another category.

The activities that do **NOT** count here as an event attended are: Chico State Sheep/ Goat/ and Swine Day, Farm Bureau Farm Day, Farm Bureau Crab Feed, and Friends of the Fair Dinner, as they are not specific 4-H events.

#4. Leadership Development

Record each project that you lead and each leadership position you hold at the club, county, sectional, state and/or national levels. The duties you perform in leadership roles are considered part of the position and <u>cannot</u> be counted as separate activities for any category on the PDR – *for example, if you have to give a report as a Club Officer, you cannot count your report as a Communication Skill because this reporting is part of your job as an officer.*

<u>Intermediate and Senior members</u> must complete the Leadership Development Report to receive credit. To meet the Star Rank criteria for gold and platinum stars, you must hold significant leadership roles that require 20 hours or more of leadership contribution. Count all of your training, meeting, planning and research hours as well as the hours spent leading toward this requirement. <u>Junior members</u> may earn significant leadership credits if they are a club officer and complete the Leadership Development Report.

Leadership Outside of 4-H: You may count two of your most significant leadership roles outside of 4-H and record them in this category. <u>Examples:</u> Student Body President, School Math Tutor, and Youth Group Leader.

#5. Citizenship and Community Service

Record your active participation in a planned, publicized and approved citizenship, service learning or community service activity. Credits are counted by event attended, not separate activities at that event.

Do not count fundraising activities for personal benefit under Citizenship/Community Service. This includes fundraising activities that support group attendance at county, sectional, state or national 4-H events. You may record this activity under category #3: 4-H Events Attended.

Citizenship and Community Service Outside of 4-H: Count two significant citizenship or community service roles outside of 4-H and record them in this category. <u>Examples:</u> School clothing drive for disaster victims and donating at a blood drive.

#6. Communication Skills

Record communication activities that you participate in at any event inside or outside 4-H. Examples are 4-H presentations, prepared talks, radio and television appearances, newspaper articles, letters, judge at 4-H event, representing 4-H, online communication, ORB spark score surveys. Do <u>NOT</u> include thank you letters (as it is common courtesy), calling members as part of a leadership role, and officer reports as communication activities. Be sure to write them in your Leadership Development Report "LDR" if it applies.

Each year approximately 400 of Glenn County's youth participate in the Glenn County Fair and Auction, exhibiting and selling livestock they have raised through local 4-H and FFA programs. Taking on these projects is a large responsibility which requires an extraordinary amount of time. The lessons they learn are priceless and will be carried with them throughout life. They learn personal skills such as work ethics and time management; and specific lessons about the importance of health, nutrition, and exercise, as well as basic caring and grooming of an animal. The effort these children put forth is rewarded monetarily though the Junior Livestock Auction. They use the money for a wide range of things: school supplies, clothes, cars, next year's project, and college.

In 2002, in an effort to support this positive youth activity, four local businesses established a Buyers' Group. The Group's sole purpose is to financially support youth selling animals through the Glenn County Fair Junior Livestock Auction. The Buyers' Group continues to grow and support many local youth through the purchase of their livestock projects. The dollars contributed will be used to purchase 4-H and/or FFA 'no bid' animals, or for general price support. A 'no bid' animal is a sale animal that fails to have an opening bid and no follow up bid. The Group will open the bid and purchase the animal if no subsequent bid is taken. Once the sale is concluded, a portion of the remaining funds will be issued as price support: to raise any below standard sale prices.

Adult Volunteer Code of Conduct

(PAGE RETAINED BY THE COUNTY OFFICE)

All 4-H adult volunteers are subject to all of the requirements of the 4-H Policy Handbook. As well, all 4-H adult volunteers are subject to all other applicable University of California (UC) policies, and to all other relevant laws and regulations. The following requirements are critically important and, as such, constitute the California 4-H Youth Development Program (YDP) Adult Volunteer Code of Conduct.

- 1. Respect all 4-H participants including youth members, adult volunteers, parents, guardians, other adult participants, 4-H YDP staff, and other UC personnel.
- 2. Comply with all requirements of the State 4-H Office, UC Cooperative Extension (UCCE) County Directors, 4-H YDP staff, and other UC personnel.
- 3. Recognize the responsibilities of the State 4-H Office, UCCE County Directors, 4-H YDP staff, and other UC personnel in setting program standards, priorities, and direction.
- 4. Support implementation of the 4-H YDP as administered by the State 4-H Office, UCCE County Directors, 4-H YDP staff, and other UC personnel.
- 5. Recognize, respect, and support 4-H adult volunteers in performing the duties and responsibilities afforded to them by virtue of their role.
- 6. Take personal responsibility for any interpersonal conflict that may arise, whether with parents, guardians, other participating adults, adult volunteers, 4-H YDP staff, and/or other UC personnel; thereby demonstrating positive conflict resolution skills for youth members.

PROHIBITED BEHAVIORS AND ACTIONS

The following behaviors and actions are prohibited for all 4-H adult volunteers when engaged in any 4-H activity. The UCCE County Director* may, if necessary in their sole judgment, immediately limit, suspend, or terminate the services of any 4-H adult volunteer that does not comply. In such instances, the decision of the UCCE County Director* is final.

- 1. Possession or use of alcohol, tobacco, smokeless tobacco products, e-cigarettes, unregulated nicotine products, illegal drugs and/or any other inappropriate materials. Participation while impaired in a manner that impedes the ability to perform the assigned volunteer duties.
- 2. Driving any 4-H participant in any vehicle without a valid driver's license and proof of automobile liability insurance; and/or failure to ensure that all passengers use seat belts.
- 3. Use of abusive, obscene, and/or discriminatory language.
- 4. Attack or harassment; whether verbal, physical, written, or by the use of social media.
- 5. Engagement in discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, gender identity, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition (cancer-related or genetic characteristics), ancestry, marital status, age, sexual orientation, citizenship, or status as a covered veteran.
- 6. Be the subject of a criminal investigation or prosecution for a misdemeanor or felony offense.
- 7. Engagement in any other behavior that is illegal, unsafe, and/or does not support the 4-H mission.
- 8. Have private, one-on-one interactions with youth members, at *any time*, both during 4-H activities and outside of 4-H activities, (other than as approved by the youth member's parent/guardian), or an exceptional circumstance such as an emergency.
- 9. Engage in a romantic relationship with a youth member at any time.
- 10. Engagement in any behavior that in the sole judgment of the UCCE County Director* negatively impacts the 4-H program. This specifically includes, but is not limited to, conducting oneself in a manner that is uncooperative, uncivil, disrespectful, unproductive, disruptive, and/or insubordinate; as well as conducting oneself in a manner that requires undue supervision by UC ANR, UCCE personnel and/or 4-H YDP staff, such that time and effort is absorbed by activities that do not benefit youth members.

I acknowledge that I have received, read, and will abide by the 4-H Adult Volunteer Code of Conduct. I understand that my appointment as a 4-H adult volunteer is contingent upon my compliance and that failure to comply may result in limitation, suspension, or termination of my service as a 4-H adult volunteer. I also understand that when functioning in the role as a parent, guardian, or adult participant I will abide by the Parent, Guardian, or Adult Participant Code of Conduct. By my signature, I acknowledge receipt of this document and acknowledge that I have read and agree to abide by the guidelines in this document. I understand that my appointment as a 4-H Adult Volunteer is contingent upon my agreement to this document. Failure to comply with these guidelines may result in termination as a 4-H Adult Volunteer.

*When referring to multi-county (outside the authority of a single County Director), sectional, or state level this authority extends to the State 4-H YDP Director.



Member Code of Conduct

(PAGE RETAINED BY THE COUNTY 4-H OFFICE)

The 4-H Policy Handbook tells me my rights as a 4-H member, and the rules I have to follow. 4-H calls the most important rules for members the "Code of Conduct". When members follow the Code of Conduct, it helps keep 4-H safe and fun for everyone.

I will follow the 4-H Code of Conduct (rules) and I will:

- 1. Be nice, kind, helpful, and respectful to other 4-H members; and to adult volunteers, youth leaders, 4-H staff, and other adults in charge.
- 2. Be honest, honor my commitments, and accept responsibility for my choices.
- 3. Use language that is respectful and kind. Not use curse words.
- 4. Not have or use alcohol, tobacco (like cigarettes, e-cigarettes, or chew) or other drugs (unless my doctor gives them to me).
- 5. Not bother or attack others, not carry or use a weapon; and not do anything else illegal or unsafe.
- 6. Know that adults can search my things (like my backpack) if they think I might have broken the 4-H rules.
- 7. Not touch anyone in a way that is too affectionate, and not engage in sexual behavior.
- 8. Follow the 4-H Guidelines for Social Media http://4h.ucanr.edu/files/133821.docx.
- 9. Not do things outside of 4-H that are harmful to anyone in 4-H or the 4-H program.
- 10. Follow the California 4-H Dress Guidelines http://4h.ucanr.edu/files/210170.pdf

While attending 4-H overnight events I will:

- 1. Be in my room when I'm supposed to be there.
- 2. Not leave the grounds unless an adult in charge gives me permission, and only if there are two adults with me.
- 3. Only enter my own assigned sleeping area and will not invite any kids who aren't 4-H members into the sleeping areas.
- 4. Be responsible for any damage caused by my actions.
- 5. Follow all the rules for that event.

Consequences

Anyone who sees someone break the Member Code of Conduct should tell the adult in charge right away. That adult will tell that member's parent or guardian. Consequences for breaking the 4-H rules may include:

- 1. Sending the member home.
- 2. Having the member meet with 4-H adults, talk about how the member can learn from what they've done, and decide what the member should do to make up for any harm done.
- 3. Charging the member (or their parents/guardians) for the cost of repairs to property that the member damaged.
- 4. Giving the member a warning, barring them from future events, suspending their membership, or terminating their membership.
- 5. Taking the member to the nearest law enforcement agency or other proper authority.
