


Livestock Field Day Approaching Fast


Looking For 4-H Stories



The Emerald Star rank is part of the star rank program and gives all 4-H members the opportunity to serve their clubs, districts, county and/or community without applying for All Star and/or as a stepping stone to the rank of All Star or BLAST member. You must be in the 8th grade or older in the current project year and hold a gold star rank. If you are interested in applying or would like more information, please contact the 4-H Office at 865-1107. The application deadline is **November 15th**.

Memorial Scholarship Fund

2008-2009 Pete Conrad Spirit of Innovation Awards Launched

The Pete Conrad Spirit of Innovation Awards combine education, innovation and entrepreneurship by challenging high school students to design products using science and technology. The competition includes platforms in personal spaceflight, lunar exploration and renewable energy. To compete, teams develop their concept, submit a business plan, and become public Ambassadors for their ideas. Students will compete for over \$120,000 of prize money as well as the opportunities to connect with leading scientists, engineers, and entrepreneurs. The awards create a long term community for students and teachers that provides the resources and opportunities needed to develop and incubate commercial products. 
4-H Hat

Your 4-H hat identifies you as a member of this national youth organization and serves to display many of your achievements. You may wear your hat to 4-H activities such as tours, meetings and field days.

Achievement pins are fastened to the service stripes, starting with the first-year pin next to the 4-H clover. The All-Star pin should be fastened to the center of the All-Star emblem. Medals may be worn on either side of the cap, but not too many of them. No other pins or ribbons should be worn on the cap. The cap should reflect the dignity of 4-H Club work, and not be cheapened by fastening to it every emblem, award, and ribbon won by the wearer.

Keep your cap clean, especially when you wear it with the full uniform.

The green hat is worn by members through the eighth grade and the white hat is worn by members in the ninth grade and above.



4-H/FFA/Junior Grange Membership Clarified

When a member maintains projects in 4-H, FFA and Junior Grange, the projects may not be in the same kind of livestock or crop.

A member of an FFA chapter, Junior Grange or 4-H club may transfer projects from one organization to another only ONCE during a calendar year.

To be able to show a project at a fair or show, it must be under the supervision of the organization under which it will be shown for at least 60 days prior to the fair or show (120 days for a market beef.)

So You Want To Raise A Sheep...

So, you've decided to raise a sheep. Maybe your Mom's making you do it, or you need the money, maybe you just want something to do, or know that it looks great on applications and resumes. Either way, there's some important stuff you'll need to know before you begin. You first need to know what you're getting into. Out of all the animal projects at the Glenn County Fair, sheep is one of the most demanding and competitive. They are neither as good natured as goats, nor as straightforward (and clever) as pigs. They are stubborn, stupid (no joke, mine once spent the whole day ramming his head into a sharp fence hoping to get to the other side), jumpy, picky and demanding. You will have to be patient; raising one is truly an art-form (talk to any Grand Champion winner). One of the most important aspects of raising a sheep is responsibility. You will have to keep track of your own finances, look for breeders and care for lamb at least an hour a day for it to be ready for fair.

Before you even consider raising a sheep, you first have to understand your job. As the owner of your lamb, you are responsible for the welfare of your animal and his health. You must know what you are feeding it - and why, make sure it is getting all his essential nutrients and that he is healthy (vaccinations up-to-date, scrapies tags, etc.) and be sure that he is in top shape for sale. This is because your lamb is going to end up on someone's dinner plate. You are just as responsible as Sav-Mor would be, if they sold defective meat. If your lamb has something in it that it shouldn't, no one will be blamed but you. You are the supplier, your buyer is the consumer; it is a business relationship and should be treated like one.

One thing that many people don't understand about raising any animal is the importance of keeping financial records. Some parents will pay for your supplies and sheep for you, but any that want you to understand the value of fiscal responsibility will make you pay for your own. It usually works like this: Mom or Dad goes with you to the feed store and purchase all your stuff for you. You keep the receipts and a list of purchases and at the end of the year, deduct it from your check. It doesn't exactly sound appealing, but that's exactly how it works in the real world. Farmers get loans from banks so they are able to raise their animals, and then take them to slaughter and pay back the banks. It's hard work, but it really makes you appreciate what you've earned.

Once January has rolled around, it's time to start looking a breeder (the deadline to purchase your animal if you want to enter it in the Glenn County Fair is around March 8, most people buy in February). When looking for a breeder, you

want a reputable dealer who knows what they're doing and preferable has been doing it for a while. It's also convenient if they are local, so they can be contacted for any questions or problems you may have after you purchase your lamb. Once you've contacted several breeders and made appointments to check out lambs, be sure you know what you're looking for. Talk to your leader about what to look for, decide what breed you prefer based on preference or what your sheep will be used for (cross-bred Suffolks are meat sheep, while pure-breds are show sheep). It's important to ask your breeder lots of questions; how much and what kind of feed is their lamb on, when was he/she born, when this lamb last wormed, how much does it weigh, etc.

Once you've picked a lamb, it's important to have a pen and supplies. You need to have a pen at least 5x5 feet with a shelter and sawdust for bedding. If you only have a small pen in the barn, that's fine too, but you'll need to take them out for exercise more often than usual. You will need to be sure that your lamb has a bucket of fresh water at all times. You need to change the water at least once a day and clean the bucket routinely to prevent algae from growing. Sheep are very picky about their water and won't drink anything that you wouldn't. Same rule applies to food. Sheep will turn their noses up to food that is excessively dry or moldy. If your lamb doesn't finish his breakfast, don't leave it in there for dinner; dump it out and give him new stuff. You will also need to rake your lamb's pen constantly for droppings and replace the old sawdust with fresh stuff every two weeks or so, depending on how soiled they are. It is essential that you slowly increase your lamb's intake by gradually giving him more and more food to increase his weight. However, it's important that you balance this with daily exercise, such as a walk. Although walking will help your animal become accustomed to you, you also need to work with it and practice showmanship so as to be prepared for the fair.

While all of this stuff is pertinent to what you'll be doing this year when you raise a sheep, it can generally be applied to most animal projects. Remember, this is only the basics; you will have to learn a lot more to be successful in raising a lamb. You have to understand what your job is and what you have to do. You also must realize that the price most lambs (and other animals) go for at the Glenn County Fair aren't at all realistic; farmers don't ever make \$6.50/lb. (about the average last year at the Glenn County Fair) when their lambs go to auction. So what you make you should be grateful for, even if it isn't what your goal was. While it may sound intimidating, it really can be a lot of fun and it builds character. It takes a lot of responsibility, but it is worth it in the end.

Parent Help Needed!


