

4-H and Food Safety

When it comes to food safety, we all play a role in helping to reduce the risk of food borne illness. Food that is mishandled can cause very serious consequences for all. For this reason it is important that we be especially careful when preparing and serving or selling food to large groups, at fund raising events, at club pot lucks and picnics.

There are simple steps to take to keep food safe from the time we bring it home from the grocery store to the time it is consumed. A food safety brochure has been developed and was distributed to all 4-H families with the December Roundup. Please read the brochure and insure that your 4-H activities follow these guidelines. In addition, each county will be holding food safety training workshops on safe food handling.

The University of California and the State 4-H Program share this view that food safety is a priority.

Fair Minimum Requirements

Home Ec./Still Exhibits/

Non-market Animal Requirements

In order to be eligible to exhibit Home Ec./Still Exhibits / Non-market Animal projects at the fair, members must complete the following:

- * Attend 70% of club meetings prior to the fair;
- * Maximum of two (2) meetings may be made up with Key Leader approval;
- * Participate in a countywide 4-H event in project area or Presentation Day;
- * Attend a minimum of four (4) project meetings in project area:
- * Be enrolled in 4-H by the third Monday in December (Next year it will be the 3rd Monday in November).

Livestock Requirements

In order to be eligible to exhibit and sell an animal at the fair, including replacement heifers, members must complete the following:

- * Attend 70% of club meeting prior to the fair;
- * Maximum of two (2) meetings may be made up with Key Leader approval;
- * Attend field day of species selling
- * Give a demonstration or judge at Presentation Day; (to qualify to judge: must be 8th grade or older and have given one gold demonstration in the past.) (minutes 12-5-96)
- * Attend animal ethics training every other year;
- * Attend a minimum of four (4) project meetings in project area;
- * Be enrolled in 4-H by the third Monday in December (Next year it will be the 3rd Monday in November);
- * May only sell one (1) animal;
- * Turn in record book on time to be eligible to sell at following year's fair.

Home Ec./Non Livestock Make Ups

The 4-H Office has received several phone calls regarding make-ups for those members who were not able to attend the Food Fiesta or Home Ec. Field Day held on January 12th. Remember each member is to attend a countywide event, so that they can enter their projects in the fair.

If you are not planning on participating in the Fashion Revue & Quilt Show or the County Presentation Day, you need to contact your project leader and set up a suitable make-up. Project leaders, please make sure that it is documented what the make-up is and send it to the 4-H Office.

After meeting with the committee planning the Fashion Revue & Quilt Show, it was determined that there would not be room for make-up displays. Therefore, if you wanted to use that event as a make-up, you will need to contact the 4-H Office and see how you can help with decorations, etc. and also attend the Revue portion that evening.

This is not the only way to make-up your requirement of attending a countywide home ec. event. You may write a report on a particular topic that your leader feels is suitable-four to five pages is recommended. You may also do a community service, for example, one cooking group is getting together to make cookies and then taking them to

one of the local rest homes and spending time with the residents. Some other ideas are doing a clean-up project or tutoring younger children. If you need some additional ideas for community service, please call the 4-H Office.


Farm Bureau Crab Feed Huge Success

4-H/Japanese Exchange

The 4-H Japanese Exchange Program is a youth program that operates throughout the United States to give 4-H

members the opportunity to either travel to Japan or to host Japanese youth in their homes. The program provides young people and families with the opportunity to establish close relationships through people-to-people encounters in host homestay experiences. Through this program, young people are



able to learn, appreciate, and understand their own culture as well as the Japanese culture.

California participates in the 4-H Japanese Exchange by offering an alternate year program. In 2001, twenty-four Japanese students and two chaperones came to California and were placed in homes throughout the state. The Japanese youth participated in the normal day-to-day activities of the families. Six of the students were able to attend the State 4-H Leadership Conference in early August.

In the year 2002, California will be participating in the outbound summer program and California 4-H members will be traveling to Japan for a month-long stay, from **July 8 to August 7**, with host families.

Through this program participants can:

- Share cultures, and heritage with Japanese youth.
- Learn to value diversity and show respect and understanding for others.
- Increase their language and communications skills.
- Increase their compassion for people new to our culture.
- Develop understanding of issues related to living in a global society.
- < Improve self understanding.

Market Animal Report

Remember, the Market Animal Report Form needs to be filled out on the front side at the beginning of the year (now) and signed by the member, a parent and the project leader. The back page is to be completed and turned in with your fair entry form. At that time, the form needs



to be signed by the member, a parent, project leader and the key leader. You will not be able to exhibit at the fair if this form is not completed (including all signatures).

Do You Plan to Sell a Market Animal at the Glenn County Fair?

In order to sell a beef, sheep, swine, rabbit, dairy, goat or any avian at the Junior Livestock Auction, a member must give a presentation this year at the **County Presentation** Event on Friday, February 22nd. A livestock related presentation is recommended, but not required.

Eighth graders and above who have given at least two presentations (one being a gold) at the county event <u>may</u> be an emcee and/or a judge at the county presentation event instead of giving a presentation. Presentations are required to achieve a Star Award. Adults are also needed; please sign up on the enclosed form.

Animal Ethics Training

Each 4-H member who is planning to sell at the 2002 Jr. Livestock Auction must fulfill the requirements listed on the Market Animal Report. One of those requirements is to attend an animal ethics training every other year.

"5" Presentation Award

Reminder: If you give a presentation to five different audiences, you will receive a special medal sponsored by 4-H Council. Giving a presentation at the **February 22**nd County Presentation Night is a good start! Be sure to complete the enclosed form & get the proper signatures.

WHO: All 4-H'ers are encouraged to prepare a presentation to share their knowledge, enhance their public speaking skills and compete for awards. <u>REMEMBER:</u> In order to sell an animal at the Glenn County Fair, you must give a presentation at this county event. 4-H'ers, 8th grade & older, may volunteer to be a judge and/or an emcee if they have given at least two (2) presentations and received at least one gold medal. Their participation will count for the fair requirement, but <u>not</u> count in the Personal Development Record as a presentation given.

Adults, leaders and parents, are needed to judge or be a room emcee. Please sign up by returning the attached Entry Form.

HOW: Entries are due at the 4-H Office, P. O. Box 697, Orland, CA 95963 by **Wednesday, February 13th.** An entry form is enclosed for presenters, judges and emcees.

WHAT: A presentation may be a demonstration, illustrated talk or a prepared speech and be 5 - 10 minutes in length. You may participate as an individual or a team of two members. You must be 7th grade or older to compete with a prepared speech and 9th grade or older for the extemporaneous speech category.

Select a topic you are familiar with or have an interest in and start now to prepare your presentation and practice. For more information, contact the 4-H Office at 865-1107. A 30 minute video "4-H Presentation Basics: Let's Get Started" and other information are available for loan at the 4-H Office.

WHAT AWARDS ARE GIVEN?

At the event, you will compete with other 4-H'ers your age for awards. Primary members (K-3rd graders) will not be judged, and all will receive the same award. Everyone, 4th grade, or 9 years old by Jan. 1, and older, will receive either a gold medal, blue medal, or blue ribbon. Gold and blue medalists are eligible to compete at the Regional 4-H Presentation Day on **Saturday, April 6th**, at Butte Community College. Teens, 9th grade and older, can be judges if they've received a gold at a county or regional event. Three judges and one room coordinator for every 10 participants are needed. Contact the 4-H Office if you can help.

The "Carell Kolousek Memorial Award" will be given to the "highest" scoring presenter; their name will be engraved on the plaque. The name of the "Best Beginner" will be placed on the "A. W. Bramwell Memorial Trophy". This special award is for 4th and 5th graders giving a demonstration at the county level for the first time. Former primary members who have given previous presentations are eligible.

The 4-H Club with the highest presentation points will win the Perpetual 4-H Club Demonstration Trophy. Clubs will earn points as follows:

The % of club members who give presentations

Plus 5 points for each gold medalist

Plus 3 points for each blue medalist

Plus 2 points for each older member judging or emceing the event

Plus 2 points for each primary member participating
