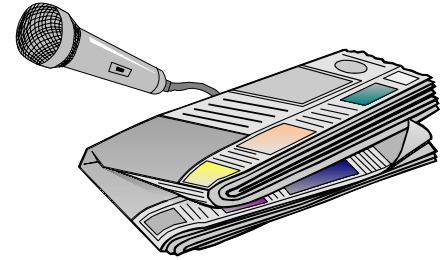

4-H CELEBRATES NATIONAL 4-H WEEK AND SALUTES VOLUNTEERS

Across the country, 4-H will celebrate National 4-H Week 2005 Sunday, October 2nd to Saturday, October 8th. National 4-H Week, celebrated annually, provides recognition to youth involved in 4-H programs and 4-H volunteers.

Pledging their hands to larger service is a key component to the 4-H philosophy of learning by doing.

During National 4-H Week, 4-H'ers in Glenn County will participate in the National 4-H Week Window Display Contest. From quilting to archery to sheep, more than 160 adult 4-H volunteers in Glenn County pledge their head, heart, hands and health toward their improving their communities and themselves. "By pledging their heads, 4-H volunteers, contribute their knowledge and expertise," said Deanna Rogers, 4-H Program Representative.

Whether planning field days, summer camp or leading a project, the skills volunteers bring to 4-H strengthen it and help the young people. "Over and over, volunteers say they concentrate on what they can contribute, yet are amazed at what they gain," says Rogers. "People enjoy volunteering when they're able to make changes in a community where they are needed."

4-H volunteers range in age from 18 to well over 70. Many of them, though not all, are 4-H alumni who wish to give back to the organization that they benefitted from in their youth. They come from a wide array of

economic situations and backgrounds, and share the common interest of youth development. In Glenn County, there are 4-H volunteers teaching archery, bowling, foods, clothing, quilting, swine, beef, dairy, sheep, rabbits, avian, arts and crafts, small engines, veterinary science, sport shooting and a wide array of other projects.
